Reading					
Challenges in recognising and manipulating sounds in words					
Difficulties sounding out words correctly					
Feeling anxious or uncomfortable to read in front of others					
Actively avoids reading where possible					
Reads at a slower pace when compared to peers

Struggles to read fluently, which can impact comprehension					
Finds little enjoyment in reading					
Spelling					
Ongoing difficulties with spellings in all areas					
Can learn spellings for a weekly test but cannot apply them in a piece of writing

Messy, illegible handwriting					
Inconsistency in presentation of handwriting					
Difficulties copying from the board					
Takes longer than others to complete written tasks					
Finds it hard to put ideas into written sentences					
Communication and Language					
Stumbles over words					
Mispronounces words					
Difficulties with following instructions					
Finds it hard to find the right words when describing things.

Has difficulties remembering sequences (alphabet, times tables, days of the week etc)
